### Year 3 - Objectives

Year 3 pupils will be taught the following objectives throughout the academic year. On some occasions, these objectives may be covered on more than one occasion if the teacher feels it necessary. Throughout each theme, (E.g. Instructions), objectives from several areas of study may be covered over a short term.

Spoken Word	Pupils will be taught to:
	<ul> <li>listen and respond appropriately to adults and their peers</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>ask relevant questions to extend their understanding and knowledge</li> </ul>
	use relevant strategies to build their vocabulary
	<ul> <li>articulate and justify answers, arguments and opinions</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>give well-structured descriptions, explanations and narratives for different purposes, including for expressing feelings</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>maintain attention and participate actively in collaborative conversations, staying on topic and initiating and responding to comments</li> </ul>
	use spoken language to develop understanding through speculating, hypothesising, imagining and exploring ideas
	speak with an increasing command of Standard English
	<ul> <li>participate in discussions, presentations, performances, role play, improvisations and debates</li> </ul>
	gain, maintain and monitor the interest of the listener(s)
	<ul> <li>consider and evaluate different viewpoints, attending to and building on the contributions of others</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>to select and use appropriate registers for effective communication.</li> </ul>
Word Reading	Pupils will be taught to:
	apply their growing knowledge of root words, prefixes and suffixes as listed at the end of this document, both to read aloud

	and to understand the meaning of new words they meet
	<ul> <li>read further words which do not follow a general spelling rule, noting the unusual correspondences between spelling and sound, and where these occur in the word.</li> </ul>
Comprehension	Pupils will be taught to:
	<ul> <li>develop positive attitudes to reading and understanding of what they read by:</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>listening to and discussing a wide range of fiction, poetry, plays, non-fiction and reference books or textbooks</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>reading books that are structured in different ways and reading for a range of purposes</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>using dictionaries to check the meaning of words that they have read</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>increasing their familiarity with a wide range of books, including fairy stories, myths and legends, and retelling some of these orally</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>identifying themes and conventions in a wide range of books preparing poems and play scripts to read aloud and to perform, showing understanding through intonation, tone, volume and action</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>discussing words and phrases that capture the reader's interest and imagination</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>recognising some different forms of poetry</li> </ul>
	understand what they read, in books they can read independently, by:
	<ul> <li>checking that the text makes sense to them, discussing their understanding and explaining the meaning of words in context</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>asking questions to improve their understanding of a text</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>drawing conclusions for themselves, such as inferring characters' feelings, thoughts and motives from their actions,</li> <li>and justifying these conclusions with evidence</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>predicting what might happen from details stated and implied</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>identifying main ideas drawn from more than one paragraph and summarising these</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>identifying how language, structure, and presentation contribute to meaning</li> </ul>
	retrieve and record information from non-fiction

	<ul> <li>participate in discussion about both books that are read to them and those they can read for themselves, taking turns and listening to what others say.</li> </ul>
Writing - transcription	Spelling (see the last section in this document)  Pupils will be taught to:  use further prefixes and suffixes and understand how to add them  spell further homophones  spell words that are often misspelt  place the possessive apostrophe accurately in words with regular plurals [for example, girls', boys'] and in words with irregular plurals [for example, children's]  use the first two or three letters of a word to check its spelling in a dictionary  write from memory simple sentences, dictated by the teacher, that include words and punctuation taught so far.
Writing – Handwriting	<ul> <li>Pupils will be taught to:</li> <li>use the diagonal and horizontal strokes that are needed to join letters and understand which letters, when adjacent to one another, are best left unjoined</li> <li>increase the legibility, consistency and quality of their handwriting [for example, by ensuring that the downstrokes of letters are parallel and equidistant; that lines of writing are spaced sufficiently so that the ascenders and descenders of letters do not touch].</li> </ul>
Writing - Composition	Pupils will be taught to:  • plan their writing by:  • discussing writing similar to that which they are planning to write in order to understand and learn from its structure, vocabulary and grammar  • discussing and recording ideas  • draft and write by:

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- using and punctuating direct speech
- use and understand the grammatical terminology in the Vocabulary, Grammar and Punctuation section of this document accurately and appropriately when discussing their writing and reading.

## Year 3 - Vocabulary, Grammar and Punctuation

This section shows the grammar, vocabulary and punctuation which Year 3 pupils will be taught in their English lessons this year. This will be done throughout the year, and will support the development of their writing.

Word	Formation of <b>nouns</b> using a range of <b>prefixes</b> [for example <i>super-</i> , <i>anti-</i> , <i>auto-</i> ]  Use of the <b>forms</b> <i>a</i> or <i>an</i> according to whether the next <b>word</b> begins with a <b>consonant</b> or a <b>vowel</b> [for example, <u>a</u> rock, <u>an</u> open box]	
	Word families based on common words, showing how words are related in form and meaning [for example, solve, solution, solver, dissolve, insoluble]	
Sentence	Expressing time, place and cause using conjunctions [for example, when, before, after, while, so, because], adverbs [for example, then, next, soon, therefore], or prepositions [for example, before, after, during, in, because of]	
Text	Introduction to paragraphs as a way to group related material  Headings and sub-headings to aid presentation  Use of the present perfect form of verbs instead of the simple past [for example, He has gone out to play contrasted with He went out to play]	
Punctuation	Introduction to inverted commas to punctuate direct speech	
Terminology for pupils	preposition conjunction  word family, prefix  clause, subordinate clause  direct speech  consonant, consonant letter vowel, vowel letter  inverted commas (or 'speech marks')	

### Year 3 - Spelling

This section shows the statutory spelling requirements which Year 3 pupils will be taught.

<u>Adding suffixes</u> beginning with vowel letters to words of more than one syllable. forgetting, forgotten, beginning, beginner, prefer, preferred

The suffix -ation - The suffix -ation is added to verbs to form nouns. The rules already learnt still apply.

The suffix -ly is added to an adjective to form an adverb. The rules already learnt still apply.

<u>The suffix -ous -</u> Sometimes the root word is obvious and the usual rules apply for adding suffixes beginning with vowel letters. Sometimes there is no obvious root word. -our is changed to -or before -ous is added- poisonous, dangerous, mountainous, famous, various

The /A/ sound spelt ou - young, touch, double, trouble, country

<u>More prefixes</u>. Most prefixes are added to the beginning of root words without any changes in spelling, but see **in**- below. Like **un**-, the prefixes **dis**- and **mis**- have negative meanings. **dis**-: disappoint, disagree, disobey **mis**-: misbehave, mislead, misspell (mis + spell) **in**-: inactive, incorrect

Possessive apostrophe with plural words- starting with singular to plural (carry on in year 4)

girls', boys', babies', children's, men's, mice's.
